ON A MOTION BY ORTIZ, SECOND BY G. GONZALEZ JR., IT WAS VOTED TO APPROVE THE CONSENT CALENDAR. APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY.

V. ACTION/DISCUSSION ITEMS

- A. Action: Adoption of Resolution: Approval of the City Engineer’s Reports for the Assessments at the Parkwood, Gentle Hills Estates, Olive Estates, Castle Rock Park, Olive Vista and Castle Rock Park Phase II Landscape and Lighting Districts and Set July 13, 2015, for a Public Hearing to set the Rates for Each District
City Administrator Lara reported the following: annually, as part of the Landscape and Lighting Act of 1972, Council sets a public hearing date for those wishing to comment on any of the individual assessment districts in the City of Woodlake. This year that date will be set as July 13, 2015. All assessment district property owners have been notified of the public hearing date and location. Prior to any action by the City Council, the City Engineer develops an engineer’s report that breaks down the costs necessary to maintain each assessment district. Councilmember Ortiz asked if the fees have changed. City Administrator Lara stated no.

ON A MOTION BY MARTINEZ, SECOND BY ORTIZ IT WAS VOTED TO ADOPT THE RESOLUTION AND APPROVE THE CITY ENGINEER’S REPORTS AND SET THE PUBLIC HEARING DATE FOR JULY 13, 2015 FOR THE LANDSCAPE AND LIGHTING DISTRICTS. APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY.

- B. Action: Adoption of Resolution: Approval of Emergency Expenditures for the Development and Implementation of the City of Woodlake Well Project

City Administrator Lara reported the following: the Council declared a drought emergency on the 26th day of May 2015 by Resolution No. 15-45 and by Resolution No. 15-46 the Council approved an exemption pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and State CEQA Guidelines relating to the environmental evaluation of the City of Woodlake Water Well Project. The City of Woodlake water system is made up of five wells that are used as the only source to provide potable water to its residents. The wells have seen a consistent drop in groundwater level due to the drought and diversion of water, which has increased ground water pumping in the area. These conditions have created a situation where City wells will need to be updated or replaced. Due to the low water table, the wells have also become very inefficient. All these factors have created a burden on the City's water system. The continued drought and pumping of groundwater in the area, the City water system has begun to struggle to meet the demand of its customers. Water tables continue to fall and wells continue to become more inefficient. In an effort to protect the City's water resources, the City has taken the necessary steps towards drilling new City wells and is looking at options to make their current wells more efficient. Pervasive drought conditions have also significantly increased demand for well contractors, who now have very long waiting lists to drill wells and no incentive to engage a bidding process, thereby creating procurement challenges for local public agencies. The City has also implemented its Stage 4 water regulations and has made major cuts in the use of water at City facilities. At this time the City is prepared to drill a test well along the St. Johns River within the City Airport Property. This test well will help verify that a new well along the St. Johns River would be beneficial to the City. If the test well shows that the St. Johns River location is conducive to a new well, the City will move forward with drilling a new well at that site. City staff believes that if a new, deeper well is not added to the current water system immediately then the City may not have the ability to meet its customers' demands this summer. Staff is requesting that Council declare this situation an emergency and allow for the expenditure of public money to safeguard the health of City residents. The declaration of an emergency, if passed by four-fifths votes of its members, will allow the expenditure of public money for a new City well, which will allow the City to meet its consumers' demands this summer and in the future. The declaration will help streamline the construction of the well by allowing the City to forego a competitive bid process as per the Public Contract Code. If the Council approves such action then the declaration of emergency will have to be re-approved by a four-fifths vote at every regularly scheduled meeting until the action is terminated. Councilmember Martinez asked what the depth of our current wells is. City Administrator Lara stated about 180-200 ft. The city wells used to work at 75% capacity but now with everyone pumping from same well the wells are working at 30% to 40% capacity. Councilmember Martinez stated he spoke to a Councilmember from the City of Hanford and they have to go down 1000 ft. City Administrator Lara stated we are not in the same situation as Hanford. Mayor Mendoza stated the further west you go, the deeper the well, due to the area. He also asked if proposals have gone out. City Administrator Lara stated we currently have one company for the test well.

ON A MOTION BY MARTINEZ, SECOND BY G. GONZALEZ JR., IT WAS VOTED TO ADOPT THE RESOLUTION AND APPROVE THE EMERGENCY EXPENDITURES FOR THE CITY OF WOODLAKE WELL PROJECT. APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY.

- C. Action: Adoption of Resolution: Continuation of the Proclamation of the Existence of a Local Drought Emergency for the City of Woodlake
City Administrator Lara reported the following: The City has begun to request informal bids for the construction of a test well along the St. Johns River. Well contractors are in large demand and soliciting bids has been a challenge. Most contractors are booked for extended periods of time and will not be available until next calendar year. As the City's need for a new well increases, it will be key that the City is able to find a contractor that has the ability to construct a well immediately. The City Council would review the need for continuing the local drought emergency at least once every 30 days until the Council terminates the local drought emergency.

ON A MOTION BY ORTIZ, SECOND BY MARTINEZ IT WAS VOTED TO ADOPT THE RESOLUTION AND CONTINUE THE EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL DROUGHT EMERGENCY FOR THE CITY OF WOODLAKE. APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY.

- D. Action: Adoption of Resolution: Approval of Response to Grand Jury
City Employee Waters reported the following: the Tulare County Grand Jury has requested a response from the City of Woodlake regarding the City's compliance with California's open meeting laws. The Grand Jury had the following findings and recommendations and the City response is italicized under each finding and recommendation:

F1. Adherence to the provisions of California's "open meetings" laws requires diligence on the part of public officials; vigilance on the part of those they serve; and good faith on the part of both.

The Woodlake City Council agrees with the finding. Adherence to open meeting laws requires diligence on the part of the City's public officials and vigilance on the part of those that we serve.

R1. All Tulare County public agencies strictly adhere to the provisions of California open meeting laws.

This recommendation has been implemented. The Woodlake City Council agrees to continue to adhere to the provision of the California open meeting laws.

R2. All elected/appointed members of Tulare County special districts, school boards, planning commissions, etc. participate in Tulare County Counsel's annual board training.

The City of Woodlake's attorney provides in-house training to Woodlake's City Council and Planning Commission members regarding open meeting laws. The City will continue to offer this training to the Woodlake City Council and Planning Commission.

R3. The eight incorporated cities in Tulare County convey the findings of this report to all public boards within their jurisdiction.

This recommendation has not yet been implemented, but will be implemented. The City Council will convey the finding of this report to public boards within Woodlake's jurisdiction by August 1, 2015.

R4. Tulare County Local Agency Formation Commissions (LAFCO) conveys the findings of this report to all the agencies within their jurisdiction.

This recommendation will not be implemented by the Woodlake City Council because it only applies to LAFCO.

R5. Tulare County Office of Education (TCOE) conveys the findings of this report to all the school districts within their jurisdiction.

This recommendation will not be implemented by the Woodlake City Council because it only applies to the Tulare County Office of Education.

ON A MOTION BY ORTIZ SECOND BY G. GONZALEZ JR. IT WAS VOTED TO ADOPT THE RESOLUTION AND APPROVE THE RESPONSE TO THE GRAND JURY FROM THE CITY OF WOODLAKE. APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY.

- E. Action: Adoption of Resolution: Authorization to Go Out to Bid for Right of Way Acquisition Services for the South Valencia ADA Project
City Administrator Lara reported the following: it has been determined that as part of the construction of the project the City will need to acquire forty four (44) separate parcel slivers. The right-of-way acquisition will allow for the construction of curb, gutter, sidewalk and storm drain improvements on South Valencia Blvd. from Bravo Avenue south to the Wutchumna Ditch. The City has budgeted three hundred and thirteen thousand dollars for right-of-way costs including title reports, legal descriptions, Caltrans coordination, appraisals and acquisition. The City will go out to bid for right of way acquisition services and hire the most qualified firm as it relates to the City's project. The firm will be responsible for: appraisals and "good faith negotiations" with property owners for the purchase of right-of-way; adherence to all professional standards and the Caltrans Right-of-Way Manual and all applicable laws and regulations; preparation of all written correspondence, applicable forms and City's standard purchase agreement; coordination with City staff; performance of notary services related to the signing of acquisition documents; escrow coordination with the City's selected title company; completion of final close-out work per Caltrans requirements; and maintenance of all acquisition files including acquisition diaries. Mayor Mendoza asked what the estimated completion date for this project is. City Administrator Lara stated 180 days. Councilmember Ortiz asked if the Palm trees will be removed. City Administrator Lara stated yes.
- ON A MOTION BY G. GONZALEZ JR., SECOND BY MARTINEZ IT WAS VOTED TO ADOPT THE RESOLUTION AND AUTHORIZE THE CITY TO GO OUT TO BID FOR THE RIGHT OF WAY ACQUISITION SERVICES FOR THE SOUTH VALENCIA ADA PROJECT. APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY.**

- F. Action: Adoption of Resolution: Discussion and Approval of the Potential Change of Date and Time of the City of Woodlake City Council Meetings
City Administrator Lara reported the following: Currently the

Woodlake City Council meets on the second and fourth Monday of the month at 6:30 p.m. The City has held the meetings on this date for many years to avoid conflicting with Woodlake Unified School Board meetings which are held on Wednesdays and Planning Commission meetings, which are also held on Wednesdays. It was requested by Councilmember Ray that staff put on the agenda for discussion and approval the potential of switching City Council meetings from Monday to either Thursday or Friday. Councilmember Ray relayed to staff that his current work schedule makes it difficult for him to attend the scheduled Monday Council meetings. There is no staff recommendation on meeting dates. City Council has the following options:

1. Allow the meetings to continue on the second and fourth Monday of the month at 6:30 p.m.
2. Change the meetings as requested per Council Member Ray to Thursday or Fridays during the month at 6:30 p.m.
3. Change the meetings to any day or time during the week.

Mayor Mendoza asked if any written notes were submitted by Councilmember Ray. City Administrator Lara stated no, request was given verbally by Councilmember Ray.

ON A MOTION BY ORTIZ, SECOND BY G. GONZALEZ JR., IT WAS VOTED TO NOT CHANGE THE DATE OR TIME OF THE WOODLAKE CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS. APPROVED UNANIMOUSLY.

VI. OTHER BUSINESS

A. Information: Items from Staff

City Employee Waters – reported he will be attending a Groundwater Sustainability (GSA) meeting and will report back to council and staff at the next scheduled meeting. Councilmember G. Gonzalez Jr. stated his neighbor’s sprinkler broke and they were not home to fix it so when this happens who should be called. City Administrator Lara stated anyone can call City Hall and staff will dispatch public works to the residence so that the water may be turned off and no waste will occur and the resident will then be noticed.

City Administrator Lara – reported residents will be reminded of the street sweeping schedule. The roundabout is in construction and is moving along. Rite Aid has paid for their permits and should be starting this week.

Chief Marquez – reported Summer Night Lights will be hosted this week by Woodlake Fire and Woodlake Police. Thirteen street lights have been reported to SCE for repair. Three vehicles have been noticed for possible abatement. Mayor Mendoza asked Chief Marquez for an update at the next meeting regarding the vehicles that have been noticed for possible abatement.

City Clerk Zacarias – reported the Summer Night Lights program has shown great attendance. On Wednesday there were about 250 people in attendance. The first Friday (June 12th) staff grilled 500 hot dogs and they ran out by 7:30 pm. This last Friday (June 19th) staff grilled 700 hot dogs and ran out by 8:30 pm. The program is definitely a successful event.

Councilmember Ortiz – thanked staff for doing a great job and hopes we get some rain soon.

Councilmember G. Gonzalez Jr. – reported Youth soccer has started and sponsors are needed. There are 18 teams in the league.

Councilmember Martinez – wished everyone a Happy Fourth of July.

Mayor Mendoza – reported the City of Woodlake will be celebrating 75 years next year and asked staff to think about how to celebrate this great event. He will be attending a League of Cities conference for the next 3 days.







BACKGROUND:

The City of Woodlake owns and operates a waste water treatment facility that produces six hundred thousand gallons daily of reclaimed water. The water is currently held within ponding basins which allow the water to evaporate or percolate and is sold to be used for the irrigation of pastures or animal feed.

DISCUSSION:

Sentinel Butte Mutual Water Company currently owns twenty seven acres adjacent to the City of Woodlake Waste Water Treatment Plant. The property is leased to Gerald Whitaker, who for the past year has purchased reclaimed water from the City.

City staff has researched current rates per acre foot of reclaimed water and has developed a rate of thirty two dollars per acre foot. Staff has also worked with legal counsel on a one-year agreement between Gerald Whittaker, Sentinel Butte Mutual Water Company, and the City of Woodlake. The agreement is for one year and protects the interest of the City. The agreement is attached.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

City Staff recommends that the City enter into a Reclaimed Water Purchase Agreement with Gerald Whittaker and Sentinel Butte Mutual Water Company and allow the City Administrator to sign the agreement. The sale of water will generate income and help with the discharge of reclaimed water.

FISCAL IMPACT:

There will be minimal revenues generated for the Waste Water Fund.

RECLAIMED WATER PURCHASE AGREEMENT

THIS RECLAIMED WATER PURCHASE AGREEMENT ("Agreement") made this ___ day of _____, 2015, by and between GERALD WHITTAKER ("Whittaker"), SENTINEL BUTTE MUTUAL WATER COMPANY ("Company") and CITY OF WOODLAKE ("City"), is based on the following:

RECITALS

- A. Company is the owner of approximately 27 acres, more or less, of real property in the County of Tulare, State of California, which is more particularly described on "Exhibit A" attached hereto, and made a part of this Agreement (the "Premises");
- B. City owns and operates a reclaimed water treatment facility ("City's WWTF") located adjacent to and just west of the Premises;
- C. Whittaker leases the Premises from Company and uses it for cattle grazing pursuant to the terms of a written lease;
- D. Whittaker desires to purchase reclaimed water ("reclaimed water") from City for the purpose of occasionally irrigating the pasture on the Premises; and
- E. The parties have agreed on the terms of this Agreement and desire to set forth those terms in writing,

NOW THEREFORE, in and for consideration of the mutual covenants, conditions and promises hereinafter set forth, the parties hereto hereby agree as follows:

1. Agreement to Purchase. Whittaker agrees to purchase from City and City agrees to sell to Whittaker reclaimed water from City's WWTF located adjacent to the Premises.
2. Delivery of Reclaimed Water. City shall only deliver reclaimed water to Whittaker when it has such water available for delivery to Whittaker. City makes no representation as to the timing or quantity of reclaimed water to be delivered to Whittaker pursuant to this Agreement. The reclaimed water delivered by City pursuant to this Agreement shall be delivered to Whittaker at the west boundary line of the Premises.
3. Term of Agreement. The term of this Agreement shall be for one (1) year, commencing on the aforementioned date of this Agreement.
4. Purchase Rate. Whittaker shall pay City the rate of \$32 per acre foot for each acre foot of reclaimed water delivered to the Premises. Payment to City shall be made monthly by Whittaker at the address hereinafter provided in the Notices provision of this Agreement.

5. Restrictions. City shall only deliver reclaimed water to Whittaker in a manner that is entirely consistent with California Regional Water Quality Control Board Central Valley Region Orders No. 5-01-082 and R5-2009-0103 (“Order”), a copy of which is attached hereto and marked as “Exhibit B.” Whittaker shall only use the reclaimed water in a manner that is entirely consistent with the Order, and shall not be entitled to use the water for any other purpose.

6. Compliance with Laws. The parties shall comply with all statutes, ordinances, regulations, orders and requirements of all governmental entities, whether federal, state, county or municipal, relating to the purchase of reclaimed water pursuant to this Agreement whether or not such statutes, ordinances, regulations, orders and requirements are now in force or subsequently enacted.

7. Responsibilities of Whittaker and Company. The maintenance of berms on the Premises in order to contain on any reclaimed water delivered pursuant to this Agreement, together with appropriate or required vector control on the Premises, shall be the responsibility of Whittaker and the Company. So long as a lease exists between Whittaker and company, the responsibilities described in this Section 7 shall be performed by Whittaker.

8. No Assignment. The parties shall not assign this Agreement or any portion thereof without the written permission of each other, which permission shall not be unreasonably withheld.

9. Indemnification and Hold Harmless. Whittaker and Company do hereby agree to release, indemnify and hold harmless City for any and all damages suffered by either of them or City, including actual damages, court costs, expert fees and attorneys’ fees, arising out of or resulting from City’s participation in this Agreement.

10. Termination. Either party may terminate this Agreement by providing thirty (30) days written notice to the other party, consistent with Paragraph 9, below.

11. Notices. The parties may provide any notice allowed or required by this Agreement by delivering to each other, or in lieu of personal service, when deposited in the United States mail, first-class postage prepaid or sent by any other expedited method to the following:

The California Regional Water Quality Control Board, Central Valley Region, (hereafter Board) finds that:

1. Sentinel Butte Water Company (hereafter User), a California corporation, entered into an agreement with the City of Woodlake (hereafter Producer) to recycle undisinfected secondary-treated wastewater from the City of Woodlake wastewater treatment facility (WWTF) on 35 acres of pastureland (hereafter reclamation area). The reclamation area (Assessor's Parcel Number 060-160-016) is on property owned by the User in Section 36, T17S, R26E, MDB&M, as shown in Attachment A, a part of this Order.
2. The WWTF had been regulated by Waste Discharge Requirements (WDRs) Order No. 85-171 for the Producer. However, the terms and conditions of Order No. 85-171 were recently updated as WDRs Order No. 5-01-076 for the Producer and User, as the User owns the property on which the WWTF is situated. Current flows from the WWTF are about 0.75 million gallon per day (mgd).
3. The California Department of Health Services (DHS) established statewide criteria in Title 22, California Code of Regulations (CCR), Section 60301 et seq., (hereafter Title 22) for the use of recycled water and developed guidelines for specific uses. The 1988 Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between DHS and State Water Resources Control Board on the use of reclaimed water establishes basic principles relative to the agencies hereto and the Regional Boards. In addition, the MOA allocates primary areas of responsibility and authority between these agencies, and provides for methods and mechanisms necessary to assure ongoing, continuous future coordination of activities relative to the use of reclaimed water in California.
4. The User has been reclaiming water from the WWTF for several decades. While Order No. 85-171 mentions that WWTF effluent is reclaimed on the 35-acre pastureland, it does not prescribe reclamation requirements. While the User submitted a Report of Water Reclamation, dated 14 May 1990, it has not submitted a Title 22 Engineering Report and DHS has not approved of the reclamation project.
5. WWTF effluent is treated to Title 22 standards for crops for nonhuman consumption. No pipeline connections reportedly exist between well water and recycled water. Recycled water is applied to the reclamation area via flood irrigation. There are reportedly no meters to measure the quantity of recycled water applied to the reclamation area.

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6. The average nitrogen uptake of pasture is less than 200 lbs/acre. The 35-acre reclamation area could accommodate an effluent discharge of up to 55 million gallons (58 inches) and not exceed agronomic rates. This discharge value assumes a nitrogen content of 15 mg/L, which is typical of treated municipal wastewater.
7. The reclamation area lies within the Consolidated Hydrologic Area (No. 558.10), as depicted on interagency hydrologic maps prepared by the California Department of Water Resources (DWR) in 1986. Areal topography indicates a slope of about 1 foot per 800 feet toward the southwest. The nearest surface waterway is the St. John's River about 2,000 feet south.
8. Areal soils consist of alluvial deposits having moderate to rapid percolation rates. Average annual precipitation is about 12 inches. Average annual evapotranspiration is about 53 inches, according to DWR's California Irrigation Management Information System Reference Evapotranspiration Map.
9. Areal groundwater is approximately 15 feet below ground surface and flows southwesterly, according to information in *Lines of Equal Elevation of Water in Wells in Unconfined Aquifer*, published by DWR in Spring 1998.
10. The Producer's source water, obtained from five wells and 270 feet below ground surface, is of excellent mineral quality with total dissolved solids of 290 mg/L, conductivity at 25°C (EC) of 450 µmhos/cm, and nitrate-nitrogen of 3.5 mg/L, according to the 1998 Annual Water Quality Report for the City of Woodlake.
11. The Board adopted a *Water Quality Control Plan for the Tulare Lake Basin, Second Edition* (hereafter Basin Plan), which designates beneficial uses, establishes water quality objectives, and contains implementation plans and policies for waters of the Basin. These requirements implement the Basin Plan.
12. The Basin Plan identifies the beneficial uses of underlying groundwater as municipal, industrial process and service, and agricultural supply.
13. The St. John's River is a Valley Floor Water. The Basin Plan identifies the beneficial uses of Valley Floor Waters as agricultural supply, industrial service and process supply, water contact recreation, noncontact water recreation, warm freshwater habitat, wildlife habitat, preservation of rare and endangered species, and groundwater recharge.
14. Water in the Tulare Lake Basin is in short supply, requiring importation of surface waters from other parts of the State. The Basin Plan encourages reclamation on irrigated crops wherever feasible.
15. The discharge as permitted herein is consistent with the antidegradation provisions of State Water Resources Control Board Resolution No. 68-16. As required by this Order, the discharge will not unreasonably affect present and anticipated beneficial use of such water and will not result in

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water quality less than that described in the Basin Plan. This Order will result in best practical treatment or control of the discharge necessary to assure that pollution or nuisance will not occur and the highest water quality will be maintained.

16. The action to revise waste discharge requirements for this existing facility is exempt from the provisions of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) in accordance with Title 14, CCR, Section 15301.
17. The Board has notified the User, Producer, and interested agencies and persons of its intent to prescribe waste discharge requirements for this discharge and has provided them with an opportunity for a public hearing and an opportunity to submit their written views and recommendations.
18. The Board, in a public meeting, heard and considered all comments pertaining to the discharge.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Sentinel Butte Water Company and the City of Woodlake, their agents, successors, and assigns, in order to meet the provisions contained in Division 7 of the California Water Code and regulations adopted thereunder, shall comply with the following for the above-described reclamation project:

A. Discharge Prohibitions

1. Discharge of recycled water to surface waters or surface water drainage courses, either by direct discharge or runoff from the reclamation areas, is prohibited.
2. The use of untreated or partially-treated waste for irrigation is prohibited.
3. Grazing of animals producing milk for human consumption within the area irrigated with effluent is prohibited.

B. Recycled Water Specifications

1. Recycled water shall remain within the reclamation area (defined in Finding No. 1) at all times.
2. Reclamation shall be limited to furrow and flood irrigation of pastureland.
3. Recycled water used for irrigation shall be managed to minimize erosion.
4. The perimeter of the reclamation area shall be graded to prevent ponding along public roads or other public areas.
5. Application of recycled water to the reclamation area shall be at reasonable rates considering the crops, soil, climate, and irrigation management system. The hydraulic loading to any

portion of the reclamation area shall not exceed crop demand. The nutrient loading to any portion of the reclamation area, including the nutritive value of organic and chemical fertilizers and of the recycled water shall not exceed crop demand.

6. The User shall maintain the following setback distances from irrigated areas with recycled water:

25	Property line
30	Public roads
50	Drainage courses
150	Domestic/Irrigation wells

7. Areas irrigated with recycled water shall be managed to prevent breeding of mosquitoes. More specifically:
 - a. All applied recycled water must infiltrate completely within a 48-hour period.
 - b. Ditches must be maintained free of emergent, marginal, and floating vegetation.
 - c. Low-pressure and unpressurized pipelines and ditches accessible to mosquitoes shall not be used to store water.

8. Signs with proper wording (in English and Spanish) of a size no less than four inches high by eight inches wide shall be placed at all areas of public access and around the perimeter of the reclamation area to alert the public of the use of recycled water. All signs shall present the following wording (in English and Spanish), or its equivalent:

“RECYCLED WATER - DO NOT DRINK.” Each sign shall display an international symbol similar to that shown in Attachment B.

9. No physical connection shall exist between recycled water piping and any domestic water supply well, or between recycled water piping and any irrigation well that does not have an air gap or reduced pressure principle device.

10. Recycled water shall be managed to minimize contact with workers.

11. The User shall not irrigate with recycled water during periods of heavy rainfall or when the ground is saturated.

C. Provisions

1. The User shall comply with all applicable provisions of the *Standard Provisions and Reporting Requirements for Waste Discharge Requirements*, dated 1 March 1991, which are attached hereto and by reference a part of this Order. This attachment and its individual paragraphs are commonly referenced as Standard Provision(s). For the purposes of this Order, "discharger" and "permittee" as used in Standard Provisions shall mean "User," "disposal" shall mean "application," and "disposal area" as well as "facility" shall mean "reclamation area."
2. The User shall comply with Monitoring and Reporting Program No. 5-01-082, which is part of this Order, and any revisions thereto as ordered by the Executive Officer.
3. **By 26 July 2001**, a Title 22 Engineering Report shall be submitted to this office and to DHS to ensure that the reclamation project complies with Title 22. Once DHS and the Executive Officer approve the Report, this Provision will be considered satisfied.
4. **By 26 June 2001**, the Producer shall commence monitoring the flow of recycled water to the reclamation area. The Producer shall also submit a written report indicating how this flow is quantified (e.g., flow meter). Once the Executive Officer approves this report, this Provision will be considered satisfied.
5. Supplementing recycled water by connection with a domestic drinking water source or an irrigation or industrial well shall not occur without an air gap device or backflow prevention device that complies with Title 17, CCR, Section 7604 et seq.
6. All reasonable steps to minimize or prevent any discharge in violation of this Order that has reasonable likelihood of adversely affecting human health shall be taken. In such an event, the circumstances shall be reported to Board staff within 24 hours from the time of discovery. Notification in writing shall be confirmed within two weeks. The written notification shall state the measures being taken to prevent recurrences and shall include a timetable for corrective actions.
7. This Order does not convey any property rights of any sort or any exclusive privileges. The requirements prescribed herein do not authorize the commission of any act causing injury to persons or property, do not protect the User and/or Producer from liability under federal, State, or local laws, and do not create a vested right to continue reclamation.
8. In the event of any change in control or ownership of reclamation areas, the User and/or Producer shall notify the succeeding owner or operator of the existence of this Order by letter, a copy of which shall be immediately forwarded to this office.

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To assume operation under this Order, the succeeding owner or operator must apply in writing to the Executive Officer requesting transfer of the Order. The request must contain the requesting entity's full legal name, the state of incorporation if a corporation, the name and address and telephone number of the persons responsible for contact with the Board, and a statement. The statement shall comply with the signatory paragraph of Standard Provision B.3 and state that the new owner or operator assumes full responsibility for compliance with this Order. Failure to submit the request shall be considered a discharge without requirements, a violation of the California Water Code. Transfer shall be approved or disapproved by the Executive Officer.

9. All conditions of these water reclamation requirements must be complied with at all times. Violations may result in enforcement action, including Board or court orders requiring corrective action or imposing civil monetary liability, or in revision or rescission of this Order.
10. A copy of this Order shall be kept for reference by personnel responsible for compliance with this Order. Key operating personnel shall be familiar with its contents.
11. The Board will review this Order periodically and will revise requirements when necessary.


By 1 February of each year, the User shall submit a letter report to the Executive Officer containing the names and telephone numbers of persons to contact regarding the use of recycled water.

All reports submitted in response to this Order shall comply with the signatory requirements in Standard Provision B.3.

The User shall implement the above monitoring program on the first day of the month following adoption of this Order.



Sentinel Butte Water Company (hereafter User), a California corporation, has been reclaiming treated wastewater for several decades from the City of Woodlake wastewater treatment facility (WWTF). The City of Woodlake WWTF treats municipal wastewater and discharges undisinfectated effluent to four evaporation/percolation ponds (hereafter disposal ponds) on property owned by the User. Two of the disposal ponds have the ability to pipe effluent by gravity to a 35-acre pastureland (hereafter reclamation area). Non-milking cattle graze on the pastureland, which is leased from the User by Mr. Frank Atherton.

The WWTF had been regulated by Waste Discharge Requirements (WDRs) Order No. 85-171 for the City of Woodlake (hereafter Producer). However, the terms and conditions of Order No. 85-171 were recently updated as WDRs Order No. 5-01-076 for the Producer and User. Order No. 85-171 makes reference to the 35-acre reclamation area, but does not prescribe requirements regarding reclamation activities. The User has been reclaiming WWTF effluent to its property without authorization by Board-adopted water reclamation requirements or a waiver of said requirements. The User submitted a Report of Water Reclamation (RWR) on 14 May 1990 pursuant to Section 13522.5 of the California Water Code.

No pipeline connections reportedly exist between well water and recycled water, which is applied to fields via flood irrigation. There are no flow meters to measure the quantity of recycled water applied to the reclamation area. The User has not submitted a Title 22 Engineering Report and the State Department of Health Services has yet to approve the reclamation project.

Areal topography indicates a slope of about 1 foot per 800 feet toward the southwest. The nearest surface waterway is the St. John's River about 2,000 feet south. Areal soils consist of alluvial deposits having moderate to rapid percolation rates. Discharge Specifications and Monitoring Requirements

This Order prohibits animals producing milk for human consumption from grazing on the reclamation area, and requires that recycled water be monitored for flow and applied at hydraulic and agronomic rates considering the crop, soil, climate, and irrigation management system. Further, fertilizers and other nitrogen loading sources (i.e., cattle) need to be considered in conducting a nitrogen balance. The California Regional Water Quality Control Board, Central Valley Region, (hereafter Central Valley Water Board), finds that:

1. Waste Discharge Requirements (WDRs) Order No. 5-01-076, adopted by the Central Valley Water Board on 27 April 2001, for the City of Woodlake (hereafter City or Discharger) and Sentinel Butte Water Company, regulates the City's wastewater treatment facility (WWTF) located in the southeast quarter of Section 36, Township T17S, Range R26E, MDB&M, and less than a mile south of the City of Woodlake in Tulare County.
2. WDRs Order No. 5-01-076 authorizes a discharge of 1.0 million gallons per day (mgd) of undisinfected secondary treated wastewater to four percolation ponds and one emergency pond.
3. The WWTF is on property owned by the City. The City historically has supplied WWTF effluent for reclamation on 35 acres of farmland (Assessor's Parcel Number 060-160-016) (Reclamation Area) owned by Sentinel Butte Water Company, a California Corporation. The recycling of WWTF effluent on the Reclamation Area is regulated by Water Reclamation Requirements (WRRs) Order No. 01-082, which names the City of Woodlake as the producer and Sentinel Butte Water Company as the user of reclaimed water.
4. The WWTF is also regulated by Cease and Desist Order (CDO) No. 5-01-077, which addresses effluent Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD) and Total Suspended Solids (TSS) exceedances.
5. In July 2008, the Discharger submitted a Report of Waste Discharge (RWD) for a proposed WWTF upgrade. The RWD indicates that the peak daily flow and peak monthly flow will be approximately 1.87 mgd and 1.38 mgd, respectively, for Phase One and about 2.52 mgd and 1.92 mgd, respectively, for Phase Two.
6. WDRs Order No. 5-01-076 needs to be updated to ensure that the discharge is consistent with Central Valley Water Board plans and policies and prescribe requirements that reflect changes the Discharger has made to its WWTF operation.

Wastewater Treatment Facility

7. The existing WWTF consists of headworks, two bentonite-lined aerated lagoons, four percolation ponds with an approximate total area of 9.6 acres, and one emergency pond (approximately 5.6 acres).
8. For Phase One, the Discharger proposes to construct a new headworks that will include one manual bar screen and one mechanical bar screen, and a new magnetic flow meter. There will be two treatment trains running in parallel. Each treatment train will consist of one 0.60-million-gallon (MG) oxidation ditch, and one 0.20-MG anoxic basin to remove BOD and nitrogen, and one 55-foot-diameter secondary clarifier. The existing aerated lagoons will be converted to asphalt-lined sludge drying beds and two new percolation ponds will be constructed. A schematic plan of the WWTF is shown on Attachment A and a process flow schematic is shown on Attachment B. Both of these are attached hereto and made part of this Order by reference.
9. In Phase Two, the Discharger is proposing to install a third treatment train that will run in parallel with the treatment trains in Phase One. The third treatment train will include an additional oxidation ditch and anoxic basin, which will be the same size as the others. An additional 55-foot-diameter secondary clarifier and one additional asphalt-lined sludge drying bed will be constructed as well.
10. Self-Monitoring data from January 2007 through December 2008 contained in the Discharger's Self-Monitoring Reports (SMRs) characterize the discharge as follows:

11. Current data shows low influent BOD and TSS concentrations. This is likely not representative of the wastewater at the WWTF but a result of collecting grab samples of the influent rather than composite samples. According to the RWD, the consultant designed the upgraded WWTF based on influent BOD and TSS concentrations of 240 and 270 mg/L, respectively.

12. According to the RWD, the proposed WWTF will produce an effluent that will meet average BOD and TSS concentrations of 40 mg/L, and an average Total Nitrogen concentration of less than 10 mg/L.

Sanitary Sewer Overflows

13. A "sanitary sewer overflow" is defined as a discharge to ground or surface water from the sanitary sewer system at any point upstream of the treatment facility. Temporary storage and conveyance facilities (such as wet wells, regulated impoundments, tanks, highlines, etc.) may be part of a sanitary sewer system and discharges to these facilities are not considered sanitary sewer overflows, provided that the waste is fully contained within these temporary storage/conveyance facilities.
14. On 2 May 2006, the State Water Resources Control Board (hereafter State Water Board) adopted General Sanitary Sewer Order (State Water Board Water Quality Order No. 2006-0003-DWQ, "General Waste Discharge Requirements for Sanitary Sewer Systems"). The General Order requires all public agencies that own or operate sanitary sewer systems greater than one mile in length to comply with this order. The Discharger's collection system is greater than one mile in length; therefore, the Discharger applied for, and is covered by, the General Order.

Site-Specific Conditions

15. The WWTF and Reclamation Area are in a semi-arid climate characterized by hot, dry summers and cool winters. The rainy season generally extends from November through April. Occasional rains occur during spring and fall months, but summer months are dry. Average annual precipitation and evaporation are about 14 and 62 inches, respectively, according to information published by the California Department of Water Resources (DWR).
16. Soils in the vicinity of the WWTF are predominately Tujunga Sand, San Emigdio Loam, and San Joaquin Loam, according to the Web Soil Survey published by the United States Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service. Tujunga Sand, San Emigdio Loam, and San Joaquin Loam have been assigned land capacity classification of 3s, 1, and 3e, respectively. These soils have limitations that range from slight to severe and restrict their use and choice of plants or that require special conservation practices. These soils also have a hazard of erosion unless close-growing plant cover is maintained. The susceptibility to erosion and past erosion damage is the major soil-related factors affecting these types of soils.
17. According to the Federal Emergency Management Agency maps (map number 06107C0688E) the WWTF is located in Zone A, with a 1% annual chance of flooding and a 26% chance of flooding over a 30-year time period.

18. The Discharger is not required to obtain coverage under a National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System general industrial storm water permit for the WWTF because all storm water runoff is retained onsite and does not discharge to a water of the United States.

Groundwater Considerations

19. Three groundwater monitoring wells (MW-1 through MW-3) were installed in October 2000 near the WWTF. After the groundwater monitoring wells were installed, Central Valley Water Board staff determined the groundwater monitoring well network was inadequate because the wells were monitoring two different groundwater zones. The Discharger did not submit analytical data and never initiated groundwater monitoring. Background quality of first-encountered groundwater beneath the WWTF and disposal area has not been determined.
20. The Discharger submitted a Work Plan dated June 2007 for the installation of an upgraded groundwater monitoring network. The Work Plan proposes to use two of the existing groundwater monitoring wells (MW-2 and MW-3) along with three new wells. If, after the installation of the new wells, MW-2 and MW-3 are not similar and the direction of groundwater cannot be determined from these wells, an additional well will need to be installed.
21. The straight (i.e., not flow-weighted) average source water EC and TDS concentrations based on data contained in the Discharger's SMRs are approximately 385 $\mu\text{mhos/cm}$ and 265 mg/L, respectively. The EC and TDS concentrations from the City of Woodlake's 2007 Annual Drinking Water Quality Report were reported as 326 $\mu\text{mhos/cm}$ and 238 mg/L, respectively.

Basin Plan, Beneficial Uses, and Water Quality Objectives

22. The *Water Quality Control Plan for the Tulare Lake Basin, Second Edition, revised January 2004* (hereafter Basin Plan) designates beneficial uses, establishes narrative and numerical water quality objectives, contains implementation plans and policies for protecting all waters of the Basin, and incorporates, by reference, plans and policies of the State Water Board. Pursuant to Section 13263(a) of the California Water Code (CWC), these requirements implement the Basin Plan.
23. Water in the Tulare Lake Basin is in short supply, requiring importation of surface water from other parts of the State. The Basin Plan encourages recycling on irrigated crops wherever feasible and indicates that evaporation of recyclable wastewater is not an acceptable permanent disposal method where the opportunity exists to replace an existing use or proposed use of fresh water with recycled water.

24. The WWTF is in Detailed Analysis Unit (DAU) No. 242 within the Kaweah Basin hydrologic unit. The Basin Plan identifies the beneficial uses of groundwater in this DAU as municipal and domestic supply, agricultural supply, industrial service and process supply, water contact recreation, and non-contact water recreation.
25. The Basin Plan includes a water quality objective for chemical constituents that, at a minimum, require waters designated as domestic or municipal supply to meet the maximum contaminant levels (MCLs) specified in Title 22 of the California Code of Regulations (CCR). The Basin Plan recognizes that the Central Valley Water Board may apply limits more stringent than MCLs to ensure that waters do not contain chemical constituents in concentrations that adversely affect beneficial uses.
26. The Basin Plan establishes narrative water quality objectives for Chemical Constituents, Taste and Odors, and Toxicity. The Toxicity objective, in summary, requires that groundwater be maintained free of toxic substances in concentrations that produce detrimental physiological responses in human, plant, animal, or aquatic life associated with designated beneficial uses. Quantifying a narrative water quality objective requires a site-specific evaluation of those constituents that have the potential to impact water quality and beneficial uses.
27. The Basin Plan identifies the greatest long-term problem facing the entire Tulare Lake Basin as the increase in salinity in groundwater, which has accelerated due to the intensive use of soil and water resources by irrigated agriculture. The Basin Plan recognizes that degradation is unavoidable until there is a long-term solution to the salt imbalance. Until then, the Basin Plan establishes several salt management requirements, including:
 - a. The incremental increase in salts from use and treatment must be controlled to the extent possible. The maximum EC shall not exceed the EC of the source water plus 500 $\mu\text{mhos/cm}$. When the source water is from more than one source, the EC shall be a weighted average of all sources.
 - b. Discharges to areas that may recharge good quality groundwater shall not exceed an EC of 1,000 $\mu\text{mhos/cm}$, a chloride content of 175 mg/L, or boron content of 1.0 mg/L.

These effluent limits are considered best practicable treatment or control (BPTC).

28. The Basin Plan requires municipal WWTFs that discharge to land to comply with treatment performance standards for BOD and TSS. WWTFs that preclude public access and are greater than 1 mgd must provide removal of 80 percent or reduction to 40 mg/L, whichever is more restrictive, for both BOD and TSS.

Antidegradation Analysis

29. State Water Board Resolution No. 68-16 ("Policy with Respect to Maintaining High Quality Water of the State") prohibits degradation of groundwater unless it has been shown that:
 - a. The degradation is consistent with the maximum benefits to the people of the State;
 - b. The degradation will not unreasonable affect present and anticipated future beneficial uses;
 - c. The degradation does not result in water quality less than that prescribed in state and regional policies, including violation of one or more water quality objectives, and
 - d. The Discharger employs BPTC to minimize degradation.
30. Degradation of groundwater by some of the typical waste constituents released with discharge from a municipal wastewater utility after effective source control, treatment, and control is consistent with maximum benefit to the people of the State. The technology, energy, water recycling, and waste management advantages of municipal utility service far exceed any benefits derived from a community otherwise reliant on numerous concentrated individual wastewater systems, and the impacts on water quality will be substantially less. Economic prosperity of valley communities and associated industry is of maximum benefit to the people of the State, and therefore sufficient reason to accommodate growth and groundwater degradation provided terms of the Basin Plan are met.
31. Constituents of concern in the discharge that have the potential to degrade groundwater include salts and nutrients. This Order establishes terms and conditions of discharge to ensure that the discharge does not unreasonably affect present and anticipated uses of groundwater and includes groundwater limitations that apply water quality objectives established in the Basin Plan to protect beneficial uses. The discharge will likely not impair the beneficial uses of groundwater because:
 - a. For Salinity, the Basin Plan contains effluent limits of EC of source water plus 500µmhos/cm and 1,000 µmhos/cm maximum for discharges to area that may recharge to good quality groundwater. These limits considered the antidegradation policy when adopted. The current discharge meets the source water plus 500 µmhos/cm limit, and is also less than the lowest numerical limit to protect the most sensitive agricultural use (700 µmhos/cm).
 - b. For nitrogen, the upgraded WWTF will treat to less than 10 mg/L. Therefore, any degradation that may occur from the discharge would not exceed a Water Quality Objective nor impair a Beneficial Use.

Treatment and Control Practices

32. The WWTF described in Finding Nos. 7 through 12, will provide treatment and control of the discharge that incorporates:
 - a. secondary treatment, including nitrogen reduction;
 - b. appropriate biosolids handling and treatment for reuse;
 - c. an operation and maintenance (O&M) manual;
 - d. certified operators to ensure proper operation and maintenance; and
 - e. discharge and groundwater monitoring

Water Recycling Criteria

33. Domestic wastewater contains pathogens harmful to humans that are typically measured by means of total or fecal coliform, as indicator organisms. The California Department of Public Health (DPH), which has primary statewide responsibility for protecting public health, has established statewide criteria in Title 22, CCR, Section 60301 et seq. (hereafter Title 22) for the use of recycled water and has developed guidelines for specific uses.
34. A 1988 Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) between DPH and State Water Board on the use of recycled water establishes basic principles relative to the agencies and the regional water boards. In addition, the MOA allocates primary areas of responsibility and authority between these agencies, and provides for methods and mechanisms necessary to assure ongoing, continuous future coordination of activities relative to the use of recycled water in California.
35. State Water Board Resolution No. 77-1 ("Policy with Respect to Water Recycling in California") encourages recycling projects that replace or supplement the use of fresh water, and the Water Recycling Law (CWC Sections 13500-13529.4) declares that utilization of recycled water is of primary interest to the people of the State in meeting future water needs.
36. The Basin Plan encourages recycling on irrigated crops wherever feasible and indicates that evaporation of recyclable wastewater is not an acceptable permanent disposal method where the opportunity exists to replace an existing use or proposed use of fresh water with recycled water. The Basin Plan also requires project reports for new or expanded wastewater facilities shall include plans for wastewater recycling or the reasons why this is not possible.

37. Title 22, Section 60323 requires recyclers of treated municipal wastewater to submit an engineering report detailing the use of recycled water, contingency plans, and safeguards. A Title 22 Engineering Report dated August 2001 was submitted by Quad Knopf, Inc., on behalf of the Discharger.

Other Regulatory Considerations

38. The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has promulgated biosolids reuse regulations in Title 40, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 503, Standards for the Use or Disposal of Sewage Sludge, which establishes management criteria for protection of ground and surface waters, sets application rates for heavy metals, and establishes stabilization and disinfection criteria. The Discharger may have separate and/or additional compliance, reporting, and permitting responsibilities to EPA.
39. As the discharge consists of treated domestic sewage and incidental discharges from treatment and storage facilities associated with a domestic wastewater treatment plant, and as these discharges are regulated by waste discharge requirements consistent with applicable water quality objectives, the WWTF and its discharge is exempt from containment pursuant to Title 27, section 20090(a).

CEQA

40. A Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR), State Clearinghouse Number 2009041134, dated June 2009 was adopted by the City of Woodlake for the proposed WWTF upgrade to an ultimate design flow of 1.8 mgd.
41. Central Valley Water Board staff reviewed the FEIR and concurred with the conclusion that the project would be an improvement over the existing discharge and that the discharge would not have a significant impact on water quality. This Order includes effluent limits for salinity, BOD, TSS, and total nitrogen. Compliance with these limits will mitigate any significant impacts to water quality.

General Findings

42. Pursuant to CWC Section 13263(g), discharge is a privilege, not a right, and adoption of this Order does not create a vested right to continue the discharge.
43. The Central Valley Water Board will review this Order periodically and will revise requirements when necessary.
44. CWC Section 13267(b) states that: "In conducting an investigation specified in subdivision (a), the Central Valley Water Board may require that any person who has discharged, discharges, or is suspected of having discharged or discharging, or who proposes to discharge waste within its region, or any citizen or domiciliary, or political

agency or entity of this state who has discharged, discharges, or is suspected of having discharged or discharging, or who proposes to discharge, waste outside of its region that could affect the quality of waters within its region shall furnish, under penalty of perjury, technical or monitoring program reports which the Central Valley Water Board requires. The burden, including costs, of these reports shall bear a reasonable relationship to the need for the report and the benefits to be obtained from the reports. In requiring those reports, the Central Valley Water Board shall provide the person with a written explanation with regard to the need for the reports, and shall identify the evidence that supports requiring that person to provide the reports."

45. The technical reports required by this Order and monitoring reports required by the attached Monitoring and Reporting Program (MRP) No. R5-2009-0103 are necessary to assure compliance with these waste discharge requirements. The Discharger operates the WWTF that discharges the waste subject to this Order.
46. The DWR set standards for the construction and destruction of groundwater wells, as described in California Well Standards Bulletin 74-90 (June 1991) and Water Well Standards: State of California Bulletin 94-81 (December 1981). These standards, and any more stringent standards adopted by the State or county pursuant to CWC Section 13801, apply to all monitoring wells.

Public Notice

47. All the above and the supplemental information and details in the attached Information Sheet, which is incorporated by reference herein, were considered in establishing the following conditions of discharge.
48. The Discharger and interested agencies and persons have been notified of the intent to prescribe waste discharge requirements for this discharge, and they have been provided an opportunity for a public hearing and an opportunity to submit their written views and recommendations.
49. All comments pertaining to the discharge were heard and considered in a public meeting.

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED that Waste Discharge Requirements Order No. 5-01-076 is rescinded and that, pursuant to Sections 13263 and 13267 of the California Water Code, the City of Woodlake and its agents, successors, and assigns, in order to meet the provisions contained in Division 7 of the CWC and regulations adopted thereunder, shall comply with the following:

A. Prohibitions

1. Discharge of waste to surface waters or surface water drainage courses is prohibited.

2. Bypass or overflow of untreated wastes, except as allowed by *Standard Provisions and Reporting Requirements for Waste Discharge Requirements*, dated 1 March 1991, E.2 is prohibited.
3. Discharge of waste classified as 'hazardous', as defined in Section 2521(a) of Title 23, CCR, Section 2510 et seq., is prohibited. Discharge of waste classified as 'designated', as defined in CWC Section 13173, in a manner that causes violation of groundwater limitations, is prohibited.

B. Effluent Limitations

1. The discharge shall not exceed the following limitations:

The arithmetic mean of BOD₅ and TSS in effluent samples collected over a monthly period shall not exceed 20 percent of the arithmetic mean of the values for influent samples collected at approximately the same times during the same period (80 percent removal).

2. The 12-month rolling average EC of the discharge shall not exceed the 12-month rolling average EC of the source water plus 500 µmhos/cm. Compliance with this effluent limitation shall be determined monthly.
3. After the expansion of the WWTF is complete and Provision 19 has been satisfied, the Total Nitrogen of the discharge shall not exceed a monthly average of 10 mg/L unless Provision 22 is satisfied.

C. Discharge Specifications

1. The monthly average discharge flow shall not exceed:
 - a. 1.0 mgd until Provision 19 is satisfied.
 - b. 1.38 mgd after Provision 19 has been satisfied.
 - c. 1.92 mgd after Provision 20 has been satisfied.

2. All conveyance, treatment, storage, and disposal units shall be designed, constructed, operated, and maintained to prevent inundation or washout due to floods with a 100-year return frequency.
3. Public contact with effluent (treatment works, ponds) shall be precluded through such means as fences, signs (in accordance with Title 22, CCR Section 60310(g)), or acceptable alternatives.
4. Objectionable odors shall not be perceivable beyond the limits of the WWTF property at an intensity that creates or threatens to create nuisance conditions.
5. Effluent storage ponds shall have sufficient capacity to accommodate allowable wastewater flow and design seasonal precipitation and ancillary inflow and infiltration during the winter. Design seasonal precipitation shall be based on total annual precipitation using a return period of 100 years, distributed monthly in accordance with historical rainfall patterns.
6. On or about **1 October** of each year, available disposal pond storage capacity shall at least equal the volume necessary to comply with Discharge Specification C.5.
7. Ponds shall be managed to prevent breeding of mosquitoes. In particular,
 - a. An erosion control plan should assure that coves and irregularities are not created around the perimeter of the water surface.
 - b. Weeds shall be minimized through control of water depth, harvesting, and herbicides.
 - c. Dead algae, vegetation and other debris shall not accumulate on the water surface.
 - d. Vegetation management operations in areas in which nesting birds have been observed shall be carried out either before or after, but not during, the 1 April to 30 June bird nesting season.
8. No waste constituent shall be released or discharged, or placed where it will be released or discharged, in a concentration or in a mass that causes violation of groundwater limitations.

D. Sludge Specifications

Sludge in this document means the solid, semisolid, and liquid residues removed during primary, secondary, or advance wastewater treatment processes. Solid waste refers to grit and screening material generated during preliminary treatment. Residual sludge means sludge that will not be subject to further treatment at the WWTF. Biosolids refers

to sludge that has undergone sufficient treatment and testing to quality for reuse pursuant to federal and state regulations as a soil amendment for agriculture, silviculture, horticulture, and land reclamation.

1. Sludge and solid waste shall be removed from screens, sumps, aeration basins, ponds, clarifiers, etc. as needed to ensure optimal plant operation.
2. Treatment and storage of sludge generated by the WWTF shall be confined to the WWTF property.
3. Any handling and storage of residual sludge, solid waste, and biosolids on property of the WWTF shall be temporary (i.e., no longer than two years) and controlled and contained in a manner that minimizes leachate formation and precludes infiltration of waste constituents into soils in a mass or concentration that will violate groundwater limitation of this Order.
4. Residual sludge, biosolids, and solid waste shall be disposed of in a manner approved by the Executive Officer and consistent with Title 27. Removal for further treatment, disposal, or reuse at sites (i.e., landfill, composting sites, soil amendment sites) operated in accordance with valid waste discharge requirements will satisfy this specification.
5. Use of biosolids as a soil amendment shall comply with valid waste discharge requirements issued by a Regional Water Board or the State Water Board or a local (e.g., county) program authorized by a Regional Water Board. In most cases, this means the General Biosolids Order (State Water Board Water Quality Order No. 2004-12-DWQ, "General Waste Discharge Requirements for the Discharge of Biosolids to Land for Use as a Soil Amendment in Agricultural, Silvicultural, Horticultural, and Land Reclamation Activities"). For a biosolids use project to be authorized by the General Biosolids Order, the Discharger must file a complete Notice of Applicability for each project.
6. Any proposed change in sludge use or disposal practice shall be reported in writing to the Executive Officer at least 90 days in advance of the change.

E. Groundwater Limitations

1. Release of waste constituents from any treatment or storage component associated with the discharge shall not cause or contribute to groundwater:
 - a. Containing constituent concentrations in excess of the concentrations specified below or natural background quality whichever is greater:
 - (i) Nitrate as nitrogen of 10 mg/L.

- (ii) Total Coliform Organisms of 2.2 MPN/100 mL.
 - (iii) For constituents identified in Title 22, the MCLs quantified therein.
- b. Containing taste or odor-producing constituents, toxic substances, or any other constituents in concentrations that cause nuisance or adversely affect beneficial uses.

F. Provisions

1. The Discharger shall comply with the *Standard Provisions and Reporting Requirements for Waste Discharge Requirements*, dated 1 March 1991, which are part of this Order. This attachment and its individual paragraphs are referred to as Standard Provision(s).
2. The Discharger shall comply with MRP No.R5-2009-0103, which is part of this Order, and any revisions thereto as adopted by the Central Valley Water Board or approved by the Executive Officer. The submittal dates of Discharger self-monitoring reports shall be no later than the submittal dates specified in the MRP.
3. The Discharger shall keep at the WWTF a copy of this Order, including its MRP, Information Sheet, attachments, and Standard Provisions, for reference by operating personnel. Key operating personnel shall be familiar with its contents.
4. The Discharger shall not allow pollutant-free wastewater to be discharged into the WWTF collection, treatment, and disposal systems in amounts that significantly diminish the system's capability to comply with this Order. Pollutant-free wastewater means storm water (i.e., inflow), groundwater (i.e., infiltration), cooling waters, and condensates that are essentially free of pollutants.
5. The Discharger must at all times properly operate and maintain all facilities and systems of treatment and control (and related appurtenances) that are installed or used by the Discharger to achieve compliance with the conditions of this Order. Proper operation and maintenance also include adequate laboratory controls and appropriate quality assurance procedures. This Provision requires the operation of back-up or auxiliary facilities or similar systems that are installed by the Discharger only when the operation is necessary to achieve compliance with the conditions of this Order.
6. All technical reports and work plans required herein that involve planning, investigation, evaluation, or design, or other work requiring interpretation and proper application of engineering or geologic sciences, shall be prepared by or under the direction of persons registered to practice in California pursuant to California Business and Professions Code Sections 6735, 7835, and 7835.1. To demonstrate compliance

with Sections 415 and 3065 of Title 16, CCR, all technical reports must contain a statement of the qualifications of the responsible registered professional(s). As required by these laws, completed technical reports and work plans must bear the signature(s) and seal(s) of the registered professionals(s) in a manner such that all work can be clearly attributed to the professional responsible for the work.

7. The Discharger must comply with all conditions of this Order, including timely submittal of technical and monitoring reports as directed by the Executive Officer. Accordingly, the Discharger shall submit to the Central Valley Water Board on or before each report due date the specified document or, if an action is specified, a written report detailing evidence of compliance with the date and task. If noncompliance is being reported, the reasons for such noncompliance shall be stated, plus an estimate of the date when the Discharger will be in compliance. The Discharger shall notify the Central Valley Water Board by letter when it returns to compliance with the time schedule. Violations may result in enforcement action, including Central Valley Water Board or court orders requiring corrective action or imposing civil monetary liability, or in revision or rescission of this Order.
8. In the event of any change in control or ownership of land or waste treatment and storage facilities presently owned or controlled by the Discharger, the Discharger shall notify the succeeding owner or operator of the existence of this Order by letter, a copy of which shall be immediately forwarded to the Central Valley Water Board.
9. To assume operation under this Order, the succeeding owner or operator must apply in writing to the Executive Officer requesting transfer of the Order. The request must contain the requesting entity's full legal name, the state of incorporation if a corporation, the address and telephone number of the persons responsible for contact with the Central Valley Water Board and a statement. The statement shall comply with the signatory paragraph of Standard Provision B.3 and state that the new owner or operator assumes full responsibility for compliance with this Order. Failure to submit the request shall be considered a discharge without requirements, a violation of the California Water Code. If approved by the Executive Officer, the transfer request will be submitted to the Central Valley Water Board for its consideration of transferring the ownership of this Order at one of its regularly scheduled meetings.
10. As a means of discerning compliance with Discharge Specifications C.4, the dissolved oxygen (DO) content in the upper one foot of any wastewater pond shall not be less than 1.0 mg/L for three consecutive days. Should the DO be below 1.0 mg/L during a weekly sampling event, the Discharger shall take all reasonable steps to correct the problem and commence daily DO monitoring in the affected ponds until the problem has been resolved. If unpleasant odors originating from affected ponds are noticed in developed areas, or if the Discharger received one or more odor complaints, the Discharger shall report the findings in writing within 5 days of the date and shall

include a specific plan to resolve the low DO results to the Central Valley Water Board within 10 days of that date.

11. The pH of the discharge shall not be less than 6.5 or greater than 8.5 pH units for more than three consecutive sampling events. In the event that the pH of the discharge is outside of this range for more than three consecutive sampling events, the Discharger shall submit a technical evaluation in its monthly SMRs documenting the pH of the discharge to the ponds or reclamation area, and if necessary demonstrate that the effect of the discharge on soil pH will not exceed the buffering capacity of the soil profile.
12. The Discharger shall maintain and operate all ponds sufficient to protect the integrity of containment levees and prevent overtopping or overflows. Unless a California civil engineer certifies (based on design, construction, and condition of operation and maintenance) that less freeboard is adequate, the operating freeboard in any pond shall never be less than two feet (measured vertically). As a means of management and to discern compliance with this Provision, the Discharger shall install and maintain in each pond permanent markers with calibration that indicates the water level at design capacity and enables determination of available operational freeboard.
13. The Discharger shall submit the technical reports and work plans required by this Order for Central Valley Water Board staff consideration and incorporate comments they may have in a timely manner, as appropriate. The Discharger shall proceed with all work required by the following provisions by the due dates specified.
14. The Discharger shall obtain coverage under, and comply with, Statewide General Waste Discharge Requirements for Sanitary Sewer Systems, Water Quality Order No 2006-0003-DWQ.
15. The Discharger shall evaluate land disposal options and conduct studies to promote new or expanded wastewater recycling and reclamation opportunities. If the studies show that year-round or continuous reuse of all the wastewater is not practicable, consideration must be given to partial reuse of the flow and seasonal reuse. **By 1 January 2010**, and periodically thereafter (but not less than once every five years) the Discharger shall document its efforts to promote new or expanded wastewater recycling and reclamation opportunities.
16. **By 1 June 2010**, the Discharger shall complete the installation of proposed groundwater monitoring wells in accordance with the Work Plan described in Finding No. 20, and commence groundwater monitoring in accordance with the Monitoring and Reporting Program No. R5-2009-0103.

17. **By 1 July 2010**, the Discharger shall submit a monitoring well installation report that meets the requirements of Attachment C, which is attached hereto and made part of this Order by reference.
18. **By 1 January 2010**, the Discharger shall submit a technical report describing a work plan and time schedule for the construction of berms, or other engineering controls, that will prevent inundation of the WWTF during a 100-year event.
19. Upon completion of the proposed Phase I WWTF expansion work as described in Finding No. 8, the Discharger shall submit engineering certification that the Phase 1 work has been completed as designed and that the WWTF has sufficient treatment, storage, and disposal capacity to comply with the other terms and conditions of this Order. This provision will be considered satisfied following written acknowledgement from the Executive Officer that the criteria have been met.
20. Upon completion of the proposed Phase II expansion work as described in Finding No. 9, the Discharger shall submit engineering certification that the Phase 2 work has been completed as designed and that the WWTF has sufficient treatment, storage, and disposal capacity to comply with the other terms and conditions of this Order. This provision will be considered satisfied following written acknowledgement from the Executive Officer that the criteria has been met.
21. **By 1 January 2010**, the Discharger shall submit a technical report containing final design report and performance demonstration of the lined sludge drying beds. The performance demonstration shall include permeability of the constructed liner.
22. **One year after the completion of the WWTF and no later than 1 January 2013**, the Discharger shall comply with the Effluent Nitrogen Limitation (Effluent Limitation B.4), or alternatively, the Discharger shall submit a technical report demonstrating that soils underlying effluent storage ponds have sufficient capacity to attenuate nitrogen to levels that will not cause underlying groundwater to contain nitrate in concentrations exceeding 10 mg/L as nitrogen.





C. Monitoring Well Design (in graphic form with rationale provided in narrative form):

- Diagram of proposed well construction details
 - Borehole diameter
 - Casing and screen material, diameter, and centralizer spacing (if needed)

Background

Woodlake (hereafter Discharger) operates a Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF) located a mile south of the City. The WWTF is regulated by Waste Discharge Requirements (WDRs) Order No. 5-01-076 that authorizes a discharge of 1.0 million gallons per day (mgd) of undisinfected secondary treated wastewater to four percolation ponds, and one emergency pond. Water Reclamation Requirements (WRRs) Order No. 01-082 regulates the discharge of treated wastewater to 35 acres of farmland owned by Sentinel Butte Water Company. The WWTF is also regulated by Cease and Desist Order (CDO) No. 5-01-077 to address effluent Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD) and Total Suspended Solids (TSS) exceedences.

In July 2008 the Discharger submitted a Report of Waste Discharge (RWD) proposing to expand the WWTF in two phases. The peak daily flow and peak monthly flow will be approximately 1.87 mgd and 1.38 mgd, respectively, for Phase One and about 2.52 mgd and 1.92 mgd, respectively, for Phase Two. In Phase One a new headworks and magnetic flow meter will be installed. There will be two treatment trains running in parallel. Each treatment train will consist of one 0.60 mgal oxidation ditch, and one 0.20 mgal anoxic basin, and one two 55-foot diameter secondary clarifiers. The aerated lagoons will be converted to asphalt lined sludge drying beds and two new percolation ponds will be constructed.

WDRs Order No. 5-01-076 is being updated by this Order. With the construction of additional percolation ponds the WWTF will have enough storage capacity for the 1.38 mgd expansion. WRRs for the 35 acres of farmland owned by Sentinel Butte Water Company will be updated separately.

Solids and Biosolids Disposal

Because the unlined sludge drying beds are a potential source of groundwater degradation, the Discharger is proposing to line the sludge drying beds with asphalt. According to the RWD dry sludge will continue to be hauled off site after the construction of the upgraded WWTF.

Groundwater Conditions

The groundwater monitoring network in the vicinity of the WWTF consists of three groundwater monitoring wells (MW-1 through MW-3) that were installed in October 2000. After the groundwater monitoring wells were installed, Central Valley Water Board staff determined it was inadequate because the monitoring wells were monitoring two different groundwater zones. The Discharger did not submit analytical data and never initiated groundwater monitoring of the wells.

In June 2007 the Discharger submitted a Work Plan for the installation of a new groundwater monitoring network. The Work Plan proposed to use two of the existing groundwater monitoring wells (MW-2 and MW-3) along with three new wells. If after the installation of the new wells, MW-2 and MW-3 are not similar and the direction of groundwater cannot be determined from these wells, an additional well will need to be installed.

Compliance History

The most recent Notice of Violation (NOV) was issued to the Discharger on 2 April 2007 for violating Discharge Specification B.3 and discharging wastewater that exceeds the monthly average and daily maximum of 40 mg/L and 80 mg/L, respectively, for both BOD and TSS.

Monitoring and Reporting Program (MRP) No. 5-01-076 requires the Discharger to monitor source water EC on a quarterly basis, and source water TDS once every three years. For several years the Discharger did not report source water EC and TDS until it was brought to its attention by Central Valley Water Board staff. The Discharger began monitoring source water and reporting the results in its August and December 2008 SMRs.

The MRP also requires the Discharger to submit quarterly groundwater monitoring data. To date no records indicate that groundwater monitoring data was submitted to the Central Valley Water Board.

Basin Plan, Beneficial Uses, and Regulatory Considerations

The Basin Plan indicates the greatest long-term water quality problem facing the entire Tulare Lake Basin is increasing salinity in groundwater, a process accelerated by man's activities and particularly affected by intensive irrigated agriculture. The Basin Plan recognizes that degradation is unavoidable until there is a long-term solution to the salt imbalance. The Central Valley Water Board encourages proactive management of waste stream by dischargers to control addition of salt through use, and has established an incremental EC limitation of 500 $\mu\text{mhos/cm}$ or a 1,000 $\mu\text{mhos/cm}$, as the measure of the maximum permissible addition of salt constituents through use.

The Basin Plan states that discharges to areas that may recharge good quality groundwaters shall not exceed an EC of 1,000 $\mu\text{mhos/cm}$, a chlorine content of 175 mg/L, or boron content of 1.0 mg/L.

Antidegradation

The antidegradation directives of State Water Board Resolution No. 68-16, "Statement of Policy with Respect to Maintaining High Quality Water In California," or "Antidegradation Policy" require that waters of the State that are better in quality than established water quality objectives be maintained "consistent with the maximum benefit to the people of the State." Water can be of high quality for some constituents or beneficial uses and not others. Policy and procedures for complying with directives are set forth in the Basin Plan. Degradation of groundwater by some of the typical waste constituents released with discharge from a municipal wastewater utility after effective source control, treatment, and control is consistent with maximum benefit to the people of the State. The technology, energy, water recycling, and waste management advantages of municipal utility service far exceed any benefits derived from a community otherwise reliant on numerous concentrated individual wastewater systems, and the impact on water quality will be substantially less. Economic prosperity of valley communities and associated industry is of maximum benefit to the people of the State, provided terms of the Basin Plan are met.

Constituents of concern in the discharge that have the potential to degrade groundwater include salts and nutrients. However, the discharge will likely not impair the beneficial uses of groundwater because:

- a. For salinity, the Basin Plan contains effluent limits for EC of source water plus 500 $\mu\text{mhos/cm}$ and 1,000 $\mu\text{mhos/cm}$ maximum for discharges to areas that may recharge to good quality groundwater. These limits considered the antidegradation policy when adopted. The current discharge meets the source water plus 500 $\mu\text{mhos/cm}$ limit, and is also less than the lowest numerical limit to protect the most sensitive agricultural use (700 $\mu\text{mhos/cm}$).
- b. For nitrogen, the upgraded WWTF will treat to less than 10 mg/L. Therefore, any degradation that may occur from the discharge would not exceed a Water Quality Objective nor impair a Beneficial Use.

Treatment Technology and Control

The expansion project will provide treatment and control of the discharge that incorporates:

- a. Secondary treatment of the wastewater;
- b. Appropriate biosolids handling and treatment for reuse;
- c. An operation and maintenance (O&M) manual;
- d. Certified operators to insure proper operation and maintenance; and
- e. Discharge and groundwater monitoring.

Title 27

Title 27, CCR, section 20005 et seq. (Title 27) contains regulations to address certain discharges to land. Title 27 establishes a waste classification system, specifies siting and construction standards for full containment of classified waste, requires extensive monitoring of groundwater and the unsaturated zone for any indication of failure of containment, and specifies closure and post-closure maintenance requirements. Generally, no degradation of groundwater quality by any waste constituent in a classified waste is acceptable under Title 27 regulations.

Discharges of domestic sewage and treated effluent can be treated and controlled to a degree that will not result in unreasonable degradation of groundwater. For this reason, they have been conditionally exempted from Title 27. Treatment and storage facilities for sludge that are part of the WWTF are considered exempt from Title 27 under section 20090(a), provided that the facilities not result in a violation of any water quality objective. However, residual sludge (for the purposes of the proposed Order, sludge that will not be subjected to further treatment by the WWTF) is not exempt from Title 27. Solid waste (e.g., grit and screenings) that results from treatment of domestic sewage and industrial waste also is not exempt from Title 27. This residual sludge and solid waste are subject to the provisions of Title 27.

Accordingly, the municipal discharge of effluent and the operation of treatment or storage facilities associated with a municipal wastewater treatment plant can be allowed without requiring compliance with Title 27 because the resulting degradation of groundwater will be in accordance with the Basin Plan.

CEQA

A Final Environmental Impact Report (FEIR), State Clearinghouse Number 2009041134, dated June 2009 was adopted for the proposed WWTF upgrade to an ultimate design flow of 1.8 mgd.

Proposed Order Terms and Conditions

Discharge Prohibitions, Specifications and Provisions

The proposed Order prohibits discharge to surface waters and water drainage courses and cross connection between potable water and well water piping with recycled water piping.

The proposed Order would set a monthly average flow limit of 1.38 mgd, with effluent limits for BOD₅ and TSS of 40 mg/L monthly average and 80 mg/L daily maximum. These limitations are based on Basin Plan minimum performance standards for municipal facilities.

The provisions regarding pond dissolved oxygen, pH, and freeboard are consistent with Central Valley Water Board policy for the prevention of nuisance conditions, and are applied to all such facilities.

The proposed Order would prescribe groundwater limitations that implement water quality objectives for groundwater from the Basin Plan. The limitations require that the discharge not cause or contribute to exceedances of these objectives or natural background water quality, whichever is greater.

The proposed Order includes Provisions that would require the Discharger to install an adequate groundwater monitoring network. The Order would also provide a time schedule for the Discharger to submit a Work Plan for the construction of berms, or other engineering controls, that will prevent inundation during a 100-year event, and a performance demonstration of the lined sludge drying beds.

Monitoring Requirements

The proposed Order includes influent and effluent monitoring requirements, pond monitoring, groundwater monitoring, source water monitoring, sludge monitoring, and Reclamation Area monitoring. This monitoring is necessary to characterize the discharge, evaluate compliance with effluent limitations prescribed by the Order, and evaluate groundwater quality and the extent of the degradation caused by the discharge.

The Discharger must monitor groundwater for waste constituents expected to be present in the discharge, and capable of reaching groundwater and violating groundwater limitations if its treatment, control, and environmental attenuation, proves inadequate. For each

constituent of concern, the Discharger must, as part of each monitoring event, compare concentrations of constituents found in each monitoring well (or similar type of groundwater monitoring device) to the background concentration or to prescribed numerical limitations to determine compliance.

Proposed Enforcement Order

The Discharger cannot comply with the effluent limitations of the existing Order and proposed Order due to lack of treatment. Once the Expansion Project is completed, the Discharger shall be able to comply with the terms and conditions of the proposed Order. An accompanying draft Cease and Desist Order provides a time schedule for the Discharger to complete the Expansion Project.

Reopener

The conditions of discharge in the proposed Order were developed based on currently available technical information and applicable water quality laws, regulations, policies, and plans, and are intended to assure conformance with them. It may be appropriate to reopen the Order if applicable laws and regulations change.

FISCAL YEAR 2015–2016

Monique C. Mello, P.E., City Engineer for the City of Woodlake, Tulare County, California, and Engineer of Work for Assessment District 93-01, makes this report, as directed by the City Council, pursuant to Section 22585 of the Streets and Highways code (Landscaping and Lighting Act of 1972).

The improvements which are the subject of this report are briefly described as follows:

- Maintenance and operation of ponding basin, landscaping, and street lights.



SUBJECT:

Action: Adoption of Resolution: Reaffirm the Approval of Emergency Expenditures for the Development and Implementation of the City of Woodlake Well Project

BACKGROUND:

The California Government Code section 8630 empowers the City Council of the City of Woodlake to proclaim the existence of a local drought emergency when the City of Woodlake is threatened or likely to be threatened by the conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property that are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of this City. The Council declared a drought emergency on the 26th day of May 2015 by Resolution No. 15-45 and by Resolution No. 15-46 the Council approved an exemption pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and State CEQA Guidelines relating to the environmental evaluation of the City of Woodlake Water Well Project. On June 22, 2015 by Resolution No. 15-59 Council approved emergency expenditures for the development and implementation of the City of Woodlake Well Project.

The City of Woodlake water system is made up of five wells that are used as the only source to provide potable water to its residents. The wells have seen a consistent drop in groundwater level due to the drought and diversion of water, which has increased ground water pumping in the area. These conditions have created a situation where City wells will need to be updated or replaced. Due to the low water table, the wells have also become very inefficient. All these factors have created a burden on the City's water system.

DISCUSSION:

With the continued drought and pumping of groundwater in the area, the City water system has begun to struggle to meet the demand of its customers. Water tables continue to fall and wells continue to become more inefficient. In an effort to protect the City's water resources, the City has taken the necessary steps towards drilling new City wells and is looking at options to make their current wells more efficient. Pervasive drought conditions have also significantly increased demand for well contractors, who now have very long waiting lists to drill wells and no incentive to engage a bidding process, thereby creating procurement challenges for local public agencies. The City has also implemented its Stage 4 water regulations and has made major cuts in the use of water at City facilities.

At this time the City is prepared to drill a test well along the St. Johns River within the City Airport Property. This test well will help verify that a new well along the St. Johns River would be beneficial to the City. If the test well shows that the St. Johns River location is conducive to a new well, the City will move forward with drilling a new well at that site. City staff believes that if a new, deeper well is not added to the current water system immediately then the City may not have the ability to meet its customers' demands this summer. Staff is requesting that Council declare this situation an emergency and allow for the expenditure of public money to safeguard the health of City residents.

The declaration of an emergency, if passed by four-fifths votes of its members, will allow the expenditure of public money for a new City well, which will allow the City to meet its consumers' demands this summer and in the future. The declaration will help streamline the construction of the well by allowing the City to forego a competitive bid process as per the Public Contract Code. If the Council approves such action then the declaration of emergency will have to be re-approved by a four-fifths vote at every regularly scheduled meeting until the action is terminated.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Staff recommends that the City Council approve the emergency expenditures of public money for the construction of a test well and new City well to meet the demands of its customers and to safeguard the health of City residents. The City Council will review the need for continuing emergency expenditures at every scheduled Council meeting until the action is terminated.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The construction of a test well and new City well will be paid out of the Water Fund. Staff has currently allocated \$750,000 to the project.

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 8630 empowers the City Council of the City of Woodlake to proclaim the existence of a local drought emergency when the City of Woodlake is threatened or likely to be threatened by the conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property that are or are likely to be beyond the control of the services, personnel, equipment, and facilities of this City; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 8558(c) states that a “local emergency” means the duly proclaimed existence of conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the territorial limits of the City caused by the drought; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Woodlake declared a drought emergency in the City of Woodlake on the 26th of May 2015 by Resolution No. 15-45; and

WHEREAS, on January 17, 2014, the Governor of the State of California proclaimed a state of emergency in the State of California due to current drought conditions in the state and said state of emergency remains in effect; and

WHEREAS, the Governor’s proclamation acknowledged that the State of California is experiencing record dry conditions that have persisted since 2012, with 2014 projected to become the driest year on record; and

WHEREAS, the Governor’s proclamation called upon local water suppliers and municipalities to implement water shortage contingency plans immediately in order to avoid or forestall outright restrictions that could become necessary later in the drought season; and

WHEREAS, the current drought has negatively impacted local business, especially agricultural based business, of which City residents largely depend on; and

WHEREAS, the City has implemented Stage 4 of its water conservation regulations, which restricts water use in the city; and

WHEREAS, the City of Woodlake depends on ground water to provide potable water to its residents; and,

WHEREAS, the City’s domestic wells have seen a consistent drop in groundwater levels, requiring that wells be updated and replaced, causing an economic burden on the City; and

WHEREAS, persistent drought conditions have negatively impacted and continue to threaten the City’s economy; and

WHEREAS, conditions of drought exacerbate already perilous fire conditions in the City; and

WHEREAS, these conditions are likely to be beyond the services, equipment, personnel and fiscal resources of the City of Woodlake.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AND PROCLAIMED by the City Council of the City of Woodlake that for reasons set forth herein, emergency expenditures may take place in order to safeguard the health of City residents by the construction of a new City well; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that in case of an emergency the Public Contract Code section 20168 allows for the legislative body to pass a resolution by at least a four-fifths vote of its members declaring that the public interest and necessity demand the immediate expenditure of public money to safeguard life, health, or property allowing the City to forego competitive solicitations for bids, as the action is necessary to respond to the emergency; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that on the 26th day of May 2015 by Resolution NO. 15-46 the Council approved an exemption pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA), and State CEQA Guidelines relating to the environmental evaluation of the City of Woodlake Water Well Project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that on the 22nd day of June 2015 by Resolution NO. 15-59 the Council approved emergency expenditures for the development and implementation of the City of Woodlake Well Project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that water suppliers and municipalities in the City of Woodlake heed the Governor's request to implement water shortage contingency plans immediately in order to avoid or forestall outright restrictions that could become necessary later in the drought season.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all city water associates, power companies, other involved agencies, utilities, and individuals do whatever they can to equitably allocate the available water to mitigate to the extent possible the hardships resulting from the lack of water during this extended drought period of recovery.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that during the existence of this local drought emergency the powers, functions, and duties of the emergency organization of this City shall be those prescribed by state law, ordinances, and resolutions existing and passed in conjunction with this emergency, and that this emergency shall be deemed to continue to exist until the City Council of the City of Woodlake, State of California, proclaims its termination. Further, it is directed that this emergency proclamation be forwarded to the Director of the Governor's Office of Emergency Services and the Governor of the State of California.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that the City Council of the City of Woodlake hereby authorizes the undertaking of all extraordinary police and planning powers in response to this local drought emergency including but not limited to the ability to modify, amend, or issue planning codes, building or safety codes, environmental health codes, and such other codes, orders, and regulations as determined necessary for the duration of the emergency.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that public employees, officers, and governing bodies within the City are hereby granted full immunity to the extent allowed by law for actions undertaken in compliance with this emergency action.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, PROCLAIMED AND ORDERED that this City Council will review the need for continuing emergency expenditures at every regularly scheduled meeting hereafter until the drought emergency is terminated or no further emergency expenditures are necessary. [Note: Public Contract Code section 22050(c) requires the governing board to review the emergency expenditures at every regularly scheduled meeting until the governing body terminates the emergency expenditure or emergency no longer exists.] **DECLARED** this 22nd day of June 2015.

BACKGROUND:

On November 24, 2014, the City Council approved the development and implementation of the City of Woodlake Plaza Project. The new Plaza will be funded with local, Measure R and Department of Housing and Community Development Housing Related Parks Program funds. The purpose of the Plaza is to provide a downtown common area for City residents that may be used for concerts, farmers market, fairs, and other outdoor festivities.

DISCUSSION:

City staff identified five properties that would have to be acquired as part of the City of Woodlake Plaza Project. The City contracted with Hamner, Jewell & Associates to assist with the acquisition of the properties. The City has successfully acquired three of the five properties and has a signed right of entry for a fourth property.

The only property that the City had not had success in negotiating on is the property located at 165 N. Magnolia St. with APN No. 061-160-022 (Moreno). On June 8, 2015 the City Council adopted a resolution of necessity for the acquisition of the property. The resolution was then provided to the property owner and at that time he was willing to engage the City in negotiations for the sale of the property.

The property had appraised at \$30,000 (Thirty Thousand Dollars) and that amount had been offered to the property owner. In the best interest of time during negotiations City staff offered ten percent above the appraised value and both parties agreed for the transfer of the property for the amount of \$33,000 (Thirty Three Thousand Dollars).

RECOMMENDATIONS:

Staff recommends that the City Council approve the acquisition of the property with APN: 061-160-022 (Moreno) for the amount of \$33,000 (Thirty Three Thousand Dollars) and authorize the City Administrator to sign all documents associated with the acquisition including the attached Right of Entry, Right of Way Agreement and Grant Deed.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The acquisition of the property will be paid with already budgeted General Fund dollars.

It is understood that this permission is not a waiver in any way of the right of compensation for such land or of any remedy authorized by law to secure payment therefor.

This permission is granted in consideration of the location, improvement and construction of such park and incidents thereto, which it is understood is required by the City of Woodlake, with the understanding that you will hereafter without unnecessary delay, negotiate with the undersigned, and any other person, if any, having any right, title or interest in said property, to agree upon terms of compensation and that, if any agreement cannot be reached within 120 days, you will promptly commence eminent domain proceedings, including a deposit of funds to support an Order for Possession, to have such a compensation determined.

Section 1245.235 of the Code of Civil Procedure requires the City of Woodlake, to give each person whose property is to be acquired by eminent domain notice and a reasonable opportunity to appear before the Woodlake City Council and be heard on the matters referred to in Section 1240.030 of the Code of Civil Procedure, which provides:


The power of eminent domain may be exercised to acquire property for a proposed project only if all of the following are established:

- (1) The public interest and necessity require the project.
- (2) The project is planned or located in the manner that will be most compatible with the greatest public good and the least private injury.
- (3) The property sought to be acquired is necessary for the project.
- (4) The offer required by Section 7267.2 of the Government Code has been made to the owner or others of record. (If an offer has not been made an appraisal will be prepared as soon as practicable and an offer made of the full amount of such appraisal.)

By granting this Right of Entry to the City of Woodlake, we hereby waive our right to appear and be heard on the matters referred to in Section 12140.030 of the Code of Civil Procedure, as quoted above. I agree that the City can establish the truth of the above-quoted matters, and will not contest the adoption of a Resolution of Necessity by the City of Woodlake. Therefore, because Section 1245.250 of the Code of Civil Procedure states that the adoption of a Resolution of Necessity by the City of Woodlake conclusively establishes the matters quoted above, it is understood that the issues which will be determined in any subsequent eminent domain proceeding will be limited to those of just compensation as they relate to the property covered by this agreement and no issues will be raised therein or in preliminary proceedings thereto challenging the public use or necessity of the project, or the utilization therefor of the property covered by this Right of Entry.

It is understood that the City of Woodlake will pay interest from the date of the signing of this Right of Entry on the just compensation paid by the City of Woodlake. The rate of interest will be the rate of earnings of the Surplus Money Investment Fund and computation will be in accordance with Section 1268.350 of the Code of Civil Procedure. Interest will be computed to and including the date of deposit of compensation.

**RIGHT OF WAY AGREEMENT
(WITH ESCROW INSTRUCTIONS)**

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between

Larry Moreno,

hereinafter called collectively "Grantor", and

City of Woodlake, a Municipal Corporation,

hereinafter called "City."

An instrument in the form of a Grant Deed ("Deed"), covering the property particularly described therein, has been executed concurrently with this Agreement and delivered to City representatives.

In consideration of which, and other considerations hereinafter set forth, it is mutually agreed as follows:

1. The parties have herein set forth the whole of their agreement. The performance of this Agreement constitutes the entire consideration for said document and shall relieve the City of all further obligation or claims on this account, or on account of the location, grade or construction of the proposed Woodlake Downtown Plaza Project.

2. The City shall:

A. PAYMENT - Pay to the order of the Grantor the sum of \$33,000 (Thirty Three Thousand Dollars) as consideration in full for the herein real property interests and for entering into this Agreement. Said sum shall be paid upon the close of escrow, which shall occur when title to said real property has vested in City free and clear of all liens, encumbrances, assessments, easements and leases recorded or unrecorded, except for recorded public utility easements and public right of way.

B. RECORDATION OF INSTRUMENT - Accept the Deed herein referenced and cause the same to be recorded in the office of the Tulare County Recorder at such time as when clear title can be conveyed.

C. MISCELLANEOUS COSTS - Pay all escrow, title insurance, and recording fees incurred in this transaction.

D. CLEARANCE OF BONDS, ASSESSMENTS, OR DELINQUENT TAXES - Have the authority to deduct and pay from the amount shown in Clause 2.A. above any amount necessary to satisfy any bond demands and delinquent taxes due in any year except the year in which this escrow closes, together with penalties and interest thereon, and/or delinquent and unpaid non-delinquent assessments which have become a lien at the close of escrow.

3. The Grantor:

A. PAYMENT ON MORTGAGE OR DEED OF TRUST - Agrees that any or all monies payable under this Agreement up to and including the total amount of the unpaid principal and interest on the note(s) secured by mortgage(s) or deed(s) of trust, if any, and all other amounts due and payable in accordance with the terms and conditions of said mortgage(s) or deed(s) of trust, shall upon demand(s) be made payable to the mortgagee(s) or beneficiary(s) entitled thereunder.

B. LEASE INDEMNIFICATION - Warrants there are no oral or written leases on all or any portion of the herein referenced real property exceeding a period of one month, or if there are such leases, Grantor agrees to hold the City harmless and reimburse City for any and all of its losses and expenses occasioned by reason of any lease of said property held by tenant of Grantor for a period exceeding one month.

C. POSSESSION – Except as provided herein, shall retain possession of the property conveyed up to and including the date of recording of the Instrument conveying title to City, upon which date possessory rights shall pass to City.

D. PERMISSION TO ENTER - Hereby grants to the City, its agents and contractors, permission to enter upon the subject lands prior to the close of escrow for the purposes of preparation for and construction of the City's facilities, subject to all applicable terms and conditions contained in this Agreement and the associated Deed.

E. HAZARDOUS SUBSTANCES - Represents and warrants, to the best of Grantor's knowledge, and after reasonable inquiry, the following:

During Grantor's ownership of the real property described in Exhibit A ("Real Property"), Grantor knows of no disposal, releases, or threatened releases of hazardous substances on, from, or under the Real Property. Grantor further represents and warrants that Grantor has no knowledge of disposal, release, or threatened release of hazardous substances on, from, or under the Real Property which may have occurred prior to Grantor taking title to the portion of the Real Property purchased hereunder.

There is no pending claim, lawsuit, agency proceeding, or any administrative challenge concerning the presence or use of hazardous substances on the Real Property.

Grantor has not used the Real Property for any industrial operations that use hazardous substances. Grantor is not aware of any such prior use of the Real Property. Grantor has not installed any underground storage tanks, above ground storage tanks, barrels, sumps,

impoundments or other containers used to contain hazardous substances on any part of the Real Property. Grantor is not aware of any such prior installations.

4. The Parties agree:

A. ESCROW - At City's option, to open an escrow in accordance with this Agreement at First American Title Company. This Agreement constitutes the joint escrow instructions of City and Grantor, and Escrow Agent to whom these instructions are delivered is hereby empowered to act under this Agreement. The parties hereto agree to do all acts necessary to close this escrow in the shortest possible time.

As soon as possible after opening of escrow, City will deposit the executed Deed by Grantor, with Certificate of Acceptance attached, with Escrow Agent on Grantor's behalf. City agrees to deposit the purchase price upon demand of Escrow Agent. City and Grantor agree to deposit with Escrow Agent all additional instruments as may be necessary to complete this transaction. All funds received in this escrow shall be deposited with other escrow funds in a general escrow fund account(s) and may be transferred to any other such escrow trust account in any State or National Bank doing business in the State of California. All disbursements shall be made by check or wire transfer from such account.

- i) ESCROW AGENT DIRECTIVES - Escrow Agent is authorized to, and shall:
 - a. Pay and charge Grantor for any unpaid delinquent taxes and/or any penalties and interest thereon, and for any delinquent assessments or bonds against that portion of Grantor's property subject to this transaction as required to convey clear title;
 - b. Pay and charge City for any escrow fees, charges and costs payable under Paragraph 2.C. of this Agreement;
 - c. Disburse funds and deliver and record Deed only when conditions of this escrow have been fulfilled by City and Grantor.
 - d. Following recording of the Deed from Grantor, provide City with a CLTA Standard Coverage Policy of Title Insurance in the amount of \$33,000 issued by First American Title Company showing that title to the herein real property is vested in City, subject only to the following exceptions, and the printed exceptions and stipulations in said policy:
 - i. Real Property Taxes for the fiscal year in which escrow closes.
 - ii. Item Nos. 3, 4, 6 of the preliminary title report issued by First American Title Company, dated December 16, 2014, referenced as Order No. 4001-4790341(LI).

- ii) CLOSE OF ESCROW - The term "close of escrow," if and where written in these instructions, shall mean the date necessary instruments of

conveyance are recorded in the office of the County Recorder. Recordation of instruments delivered through this escrow is hereby authorized.

B. JUDGMENT IN LIEU OF DEED - In the event Grantor is unable to deliver title in a reasonable time under the terms of the Agreement, the City may file an action in eminent domain to pursue the acquisition of the real property interests described in the referenced Deed and this Agreement shall constitute a stipulation which may be filed in said proceedings as final and conclusive evidence of the total amount of damages for the taking, including all of the items listed in Section 1260.230 of the Code of Civil Procedure, regarding said property rights.

C. ARTICLE HEADINGS - Article headings in this Agreement are for convenience only and are not intended to be used in interpreting or construing the terms, covenants and conditions of this Agreement.

D. COMPLETE UNDERSTANDING - This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding between the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof, superseding all negotiations, prior discussions, and preliminary agreements or understandings, written or oral. This Agreement may not be amended except in writing by the parties hereto or their successors or assigns.

E. SETTLEMENT PROPOSAL - This Agreement represents Seller's settlement proposal and is expressly subject to and contingent upon Buyer's acceptance and approval. Deposit into escrow of a fully executed copy of this Agreement constitutes acceptance and approval by Buyer.

F. NO THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARIES INTENDED - Unless specifically set forth, the parties to this Agreement do not intend to provide any other party with any benefit or enforceable legal or equitable right or remedy.

G. BINDING EFFECT - This Agreement shall inure to the benefit of and constitute a binding obligation upon the successors and assigns of the parties hereto.

H. COUNTERPARTS - This Agreement may be executed in counterparts, each of which so executed shall irrespective of the date of its execution and delivery be deemed an original, and all such counterparts together shall constitute one and the same document

The Office of Active Transportation and Special Programs published a notice of funding availability. The City working with Quad Knopf submitted an application for funding of a safe routes to school project on Castle Rock St. through the Active Transportation Program (ATP). The City was awarded \$245,000 for the construction of the project.

DISCUSSION:

The environmental and design process have been completed for the project. At the June 25, 2015 California Transportation Commission meeting the City's project was approved for advanced funding and the City may now go out to bid for the construction of the project.

The overall cost of the project is estimated to be \$289,000. The project will be funded with ATP, Measure R and local funds.
